Beckenham Place Park is the largest park in south east London at around 1km squared.

It was originally the parkland associated with John Cator's mansion, which was built in 1762 and still dominates the park today. It was then used as a golf course for over a century.

Since then, the park has been restored thanks to a National Lottery Heritage Fund grant. The regeneration, completed in 2019, has recreated and reimagined the park's Georgian origins to serve local communities

in the 21st century. The Georgian lake has been reinstated, and the original stable yard and its buildings have been fully restored to house the park café and an environmental education centre.

The park is also a key site for wildlife, boasting a range of diverse habitats. From ancient woodland to hay meadow, natural river to pond, this is a great place to be up close to nature.
