Am I eligible to register?

If you are working outside the UK as a Crown Servant (e.g. in the diplomatic service or overseas civil service) or as an employee of the British Council you can still register to vote in the UK. You can also register if you are the spouse or civil partner of a Crown Servant or British Council employee and you are accompanying them during their employment abroad.

You need to be registered at the address where you would be living if you were in the UK, or at your last registered UK address.

Can I vote at all elections in the UK?

British citizens, Irish citizens and qualifying citizens of Commonwealth countries (including Cyprus and Malta) can vote at all elections. Qualifying citizens are Commonwealth citizens who have leave to enter or remain in the UK or do not require such leave.

Citizens of other EU countries can vote in local government elections, but cannot vote in UK parliamentary elections. Those resident in Wales may also vote in National Assembly for Wales elections. If you are an EU citizen and want to vote in European parliamentary elections you must fill in a separate form. Contact us using the details above to ask for one.

How to register to vote

Register to vote as soon as you can, or it may be too late to vote in the next election.

Who is eligible to register to vote?

You can register to vote in the UK if you are:

- resident (usually live in the UK or would if you weren't a Crown Servant, British Council employee or their spouse/civil partner), and
- aged 16 or over (although you won't be able to vote until you are 18).

You must also be either:

- a British, Irish or European Union citizen, or
- a Commonwealth citizen who has leave to remain in the UK or who does not require leave to remain in the UK.



Other information

The open register

There are two registers. Why?

Using information received from the public, registration officers keep two registers – the electoral register and the open register (also known as the edited register).

The electoral register

The electoral register lists the names and addresses of everyone who is registered to vote in public elections. The register is used for electoral purposes, such as making sure only eligible people can vote. It is also used for other limited purposes specified in law, such as:

- detecting crime (e.g. fraud)
- calling people for jury service
- checking credit applications.

The open register

The open register is an extract of the electoral register, but is not used for elections. It can be bought by any person, company or organisation. For example, it is used by businesses and charities to confirm name and address details. Your name and address will be included in the open register unless you ask for them to be removed. Removing your details from the open register does not affect your right to vote.

Qualifying Commonwealth citizens are those who have leave to enter or remain in the UK or do not require such leave.

We will not give personal information about you and the other people in your household to anyone else or another organisation unless we have to by law.
