As a registered Charity, Sydenham Arts is a community arts organisation that has year round events.

In February & March of this year, we were thrilled to be able to run a photography festival, Sydenham Lens. This was a range of events, exhibitions, workshops and film screenings, celebrating the people of Sydenham through photography.

The benefit of using this powerful visual medium is that it removes barriers, which traditionally prevent people getting involved in cultural activities, such as ability/willingness to read, cultural and language or social segregation to name a few.

We were keen to engage with the most isolated parts of the local community, whether low-income, elderly and harder to reach young adults. Sydenham Lens sought to promote learning and new skills, actively promoting a positive attitude and inclusive message across all of Sydenham residents.

Workshops took place all over Sydenham and Forest Hill. The project benefitted from a range of grants and sponsorship including £1,000 Sydenham Assembly Grant.

Thanks to the Assembly grant funding

we were awarded last year, we were able to improve access to our Resource Centre for the 300 people a week who use it. We replaced a gravel path with a more solid material. Along with that vital work, the funds allowed us to run 10 extra gardening sessions for local residents. This helped improve the woodland area along the front path, and create a new gravel garden in front of the centre.

One participant said: "I found the sessions relaxing, enjoyable (especially eating together!) and informative. I hope we've managed to create something beautiful for people to appreciate."

We are really grateful to the many people who came together to make this project possible.

Adults' craft class

Sydenham Assembly kindly granted us £1,800 to run a weekly afternoon craft group for adults from February to November. Clem, from the Bellingham crafts group organised and led the group from February to July. Her expertise meant that she could offer a wide range of crafts, including tile and glass painting, bead work, textiles and decoupage, and the group designed an array of items such as painted fabric shopping bags, jewellery and gift boxes. We advertised in local shops, on social media, and at Sydenham



Garden. In September, Chris, Claire, Pauline and Heather, from the popup shop at the Green Man put together a varied programme that included jewellery making, painting in watercolour and acrylics, fabric decorations, bunting, and card making, just in time for Christmas. The classes were well attended and we occasionally had to turn people away. The group attracted interest from other library users who sometimes joined in when spaces were available. Crafters bonded whilst enjoying an activity that was creative, sociable and relaxing, taking advantage of having the space and materials available to make something special. One member called the group "the highlight of my week"



Sydenham Assembly contributed the last 30% to allow *Rhyme Time for Under-fives* to continue through the school holidays. On Thursday mornings the library welcomed up to 23 adults, with their toddlers, for a session of singing, percussion, rhyme and songs. Alison, who led the group, encouraged parents and carers to bring songs from their cultures to teach them to other parents and children. Some activities were educational, like counting and rhyme. All of the activities were fun for the kids and carers alike. Mums, dads and grandparents attended. It allowed parents new to the area to make friends, and gain new ideas for creative and educational play. Many stayed to socialise after the group and we hope that it will continue to bring parents and children together in the future.

Originally from Medellin Colombia, a city known for its drug cartels, Yamille speaks warmly of this much reformed location for being the sunshine city of eternal Spring.

She met and fell in love with her now husband, Vaughn, in Colombia, when he was in an English exchange programme for mental health practitioners. He was one of her dance students.

Due to Home Office requirements to enter the UK, although they were married, they had to live in different countries for a while before they could both live here in London.

With an adult daughter in Colombia and a 2 year old son here, Yamille straddles two continents and has successfully rebuilt her career among London's salsa community. She offers classes to all ages and abilities and participates in local festivals. Ask her why are you living in South London? she'll answer "because my husband is here and I love it!"

50 years of St Christopher's Hospice!

The world's first modern hospice - St Christopher's – was founded in Sydenham by pioneer Dame Cicely Saunders in 1967. Dame Cicely's vision to improve care for the dying and the bereaved has now spread around the globe. There is still much to be done but we are very proud of all that has been achieved in the last 50 years. Today, we support nearly 6,500 patients and families a year, from across the boroughs of Bromley, Croydon, Lambeth, Lewisham and Southwark.

We have held many events to mark this momentous year. At the start of 2017, we took two magnificent floats to London's New Year's Day parade. Our prize-winning floats were lovingly created by patients, staff, supporters and volunteers. In June, over fifty cyclists rode from Sydenham to Paris. Four days and 300 miles later, the riders cycled triumphantly under the Eiffel Tower, having jointly raised over £100,000. Later that month, Lambeth Palace gardens agreed to take part in our regular summer Open Gardens Festival. For one day only, visitors were able to wander around one of the oldest and largest private gardens in London, and enjoy an afternoon tea and live music. In July, St Christopher's held a formal service of celebration and thanksgiving in Southwark Cathedral. The event closed with 50,000 petals falling from the ceiling to remember all those that St Christopher's has cared for over the last 50 years.

We sincerely thank the people and organisations of Lewisham for all the support that they have given the hospice over the last fifty years; long may it continue.

Local listing of Bell Green gasholders

I am delighted that following the petition from *Sydenham Society* and *These Streets Belong to Us*, the Council has approved the Local Listing of Bell Green gasholders. It shows what can be done with an extensive campaign! At the recent Mayor and Cabinet meeting, the Chair of the Sydenham Society spoke to support the architectural merit of the listing and I was proud to contribute as Lewisham's Heritage Champion.

The two surviving Victorian Bell Green gasholders were designed by the distinguished gas engineer Charles Gandon and built in 1882 and 1890. It is thought that George Livesey was involved in the design of these as they possess the "flying lift" he pioneered.

The growth of the gas industry in the 19th century mirrored the improving standard of living in urban areas and the fast-rising populations. The gasholders symbolised both demographic and technological progress. The location of the

gasworks not only led to the development of Lower Sydenham, with its terraced housing replacing the area's fields and watercress meadows, but also led to the expansion of the railway. In 1857 the Mid Kent Line opened their station at Beckenham Junction and in 1878 a connection was added a quarter of a mile north of Bell Green serving the Crystal Palace & District Gas Company.

Representing a rich industrial heritage, it is fantastic news they are now listed, recognising their historic importance and giving them some level of protection.
